## Emergencies

#### **Ongoing conflict in Gaza**

Currently, the people of Gaza are enduring catastrophic conditions, where more than 2 million people are crammed into an area smaller than 17 square miles, and 88 percent of the territory remains under military control or evacuation orders. To make matters worse, famine has recently been declared, with reports by the Ministry of Health in Gaza and the United Nations indicating that deaths from starvation are rising daily.

"The continued human suffering and loss of civilian life because of this conflict cannot continue, with a peaceful resolution now a humanitarian and life-saving necessity," says Sally Thomas, Humanitarian Manager at Caritas Australia.

Amid violence and displacement, your generosity is making an incredible difference. With your support, our partners, Catholic Relief Services (CRS) and Caritas Jerusalem, are helping provide assistance in the form of emergency food, clean water, hygiene kits, shelter materials, and health and psychosocial support for children and families.

Since October 2023, our partners have supported 1.7 million people in Gaza with essential goods and services. We are also helping Church partners who have opened their doors for families with nowhere else to turn.

Humanitarian access remains restricted and the situation grows more desperate. Our partners continue to serve courageously, offering assistance in the most difficult circumstances.

Your compassion makes this possible. Thank you for standing with the people of Gaza when they need it most.

The earthquake has compounded these challenges, overwhelming hospitals, destroying infrastructure and cutting off remote areas from life-saving aid. Markets have been disrupted, power and water supplies wiped out and communications remain unreliable.

Families who lost their homes are sleeping in the open, heightening the risk of disease outbreaks. Children and vulnerable groups face acute food insecurity and an alarming shortage of clean water and healthcare.

Caritas Australia is working with local partners to deliver emergency relief. Your generosity was critical in helping our partners respond and in supporting families to recover.

#### **Pronali's story**

In remote villages of Bangladesh, where more than half the population lives below the poverty line and indigenous communities often lack access to education and healthcare, maternal health remains a critical concern. Women here are over 40 times more likely to die during childbirth compared to Australia, and for many, giving birth without trained support is an everyday reality – one that puts both mother and child at risk.

Pronali, an indigenous woman from a small village in Bangladesh, knows this struggle firsthand. Since joining the Community Managed Sustainable Livelihoods and Resilience Program in July 2021, she has become not only an essential member of her community but also a role model for expectant mothers. As a mother of two herself, she now provides antenatal check-ups, safe deliveries, and health education – saving lives and shaping a healthier future.

Like many women in her village, Pronali's early life was marked by poverty. After completing secondary school, financial hardship forced her to abandon further studies, and she married young. For years, she was a full-time housewife, caring for her husband and children, with little community involvement.

"During delivery I had a lot of complications," Pronali recalls. "I thought if I can help others in my own way, so that no one else has to suffer, it would be a blessing."

Thanks to your generosity and support, and the work of our partners Caritas Bangladesh, Pronali completed an intensive three-week training on safe motherhood practices. She learned to recognise early warning signs, perform basic health checks such as blood pressure and weight monitoring, and refer high-risk cases to government clinics.

Before her training, there wasn't a single qualified midwife in her village. That is why her impact has been so significant. In her first three months, she successfully delivered six healthy babies – and since the program began, not a single maternal death has been reported under her care.

"Now every day pregnant women come to me for check-ups and call me for home deliveries," Pronali says. "The villagers and family members honour me as an important person – their family health provider."

Thanks to your generosity, and Pronali's undying dedication, she is proving that when women are empowered, entire communities thrive.

#### **Leaia Update**

You may recall Leaia from Project Compassion 2024. Leaia and her family were living in their home, which is built entirely from recycled scraps. Without a connection to a piped water system, they relied on rainwater collected in old fridges. When the water ran out, Leaia had to walk long distances with her young children to fetch water from a neighbour.

A lack of clean water and proper sanitation didn't just make life inconvenient-it affected the family's health and disrupted the children's education. During the dry season, the children sometimes missed school because they couldn't bathe. Simple daily routines like cooking, cleaning and staying healthy were constant challenges.

Thanks to the compassion and generosity of people like you, life has changed dramatically for Leaia and her family. With the support of Caritas Samoa, a water tank was installed at her home, providing clean water for drinking, cooking and bathing. This simple but life-changing improvement meant better hygiene, better health and the chance for their children to attend school regularly.

It is clear just how far the family has come. Leaia's children are growing up strong and healthy, and their home has become a place where they can thrive. In addition to the water tank, the family now has a proper toilet and shower, greatly improving sanitation and reducing the risk of waterborne disease.

Our partner Caritas Samoa is continuing their work across vulnerable communities, installing hygienic toilets and water systems to improve the health and sanitation of families like Leaia's.

Leaia's story is a powerful reminder of the difference your compassion can make. Together, we are helping to build stronger, healthier futures for families across Samoa.



# WOMEN for the WORLD

#### An update from Aloma in the Philippines

You may remember Aloma from our Women for the World campaign in 2021.

In the coastal areas of the Philippines, extreme weather brings devastating consequences, threatening the safety and food security of thousands of families. The country faces more than 20 typhoons each year, and in remote areas, rebuilding can take years.

For Aloma, the turning point came in 2013, when Typhoon Santi tore through her village. Her home was damaged, and the destruction of banana and coconut plantations left her community struggling to find food and income.

Determined to help her family and neighbours recover, Aloma joined the Integrated Community Development Program run by the Socio Pastoral Action Center Foundation Inc. (SPACFI) and supported by Caritas Australia. Thanks to your generous support, she learned bookkeeping, ecological conservation, first aid. and Disaster Risk Reduction skills.

Today, even after stepping down as her Barangay's (district) Official, Aloma remains deeply involved in community life. She regularly works with her district's partner nursery, leading planting activities. Inspired by her leadership, the entire community – children and adults alike – built a mangrove nursery. These mangroves not only protect the coastline but also create breeding grounds for fish, providing vital income for her village and its neighbours.

Aloma has also made tree planting a personal tradition, planting as many trees each year as her age – 45 last year, 46 this year – and tending to the mangroves to ensure that they are thriving.

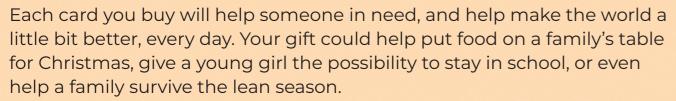
Her dedication extends beyond the environment. She now serves as Parent Leader for the 4Ps program in her district and as Secretary of the Local Council for Women, advocating for women's welfare across her municipality. Balancing her livelihood, family care, and environmental stewardship, Aloma continues to be a driving force for resilience and hope in her community.

# Caritas Australia's Visit to Baabayn Aboriginal Corporation

Recently, we had the privilege of visiting Baabayn Aboriginal Corporation in Western Sydney – a space where culture, connection and support intertwine. Founded by five Aboriginal Elders, Baabayn offers a place of cultural resilience and healing grounded in identity. It is a place for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples to strengthen or rekindle their ties to culture, Country and each other.

During our visit, we got to witness some of the stories shared between visitors and Elders. Whether it is chatting over a cuppa, children learning in the homework club, or Elders guiding others, Baabayn shows how healing happens through relationships and culture.

Baabayn also connects people with government services, other centres, and education providers like TAFE, offering culturally appropriate support in navigating these systems. It fills a crucial gap in connecting with services that often have not been designed with needs and perspectives of First Nations peoples at their centre.

One highlight was the Mums and Bubs group's book *Why Our Children Are Proud to be Aboriginal*. Illustrated by young mothers who are participants in the Baabayn Mums and Bubs group, the book brings together a collective effort in celebrating cultural pride, nurtured into future generations.

"Through artistic expression, I'm able to own my culture and honour my grandparents... Coming to Baabayn lets me speak with Elders, share experiences, and grow my sense of self," said Sheridan, one of the participants.



We were also able to learn about the Fences and Walls project, where Elders and women plant native seeds, symbols of healing and growth, which the next generation will nurture as they carry forward Elders' stories and strength. This integral project reflects ongoing healing, truth-telling, and the challenge of systemic barriers faced by First Nations peoples.

The work of Baabayn provides vital lessons for all Australians alike, such as the value of slowing down, listening deeply and respecting lived experience. Baabayn is a great example of First Nations-led grassroots programs building resilience locally and in a way that simply wouldn't exist otherwise.

Caritas Australia is proud to continue to support and amplify the voice of Baabayn.

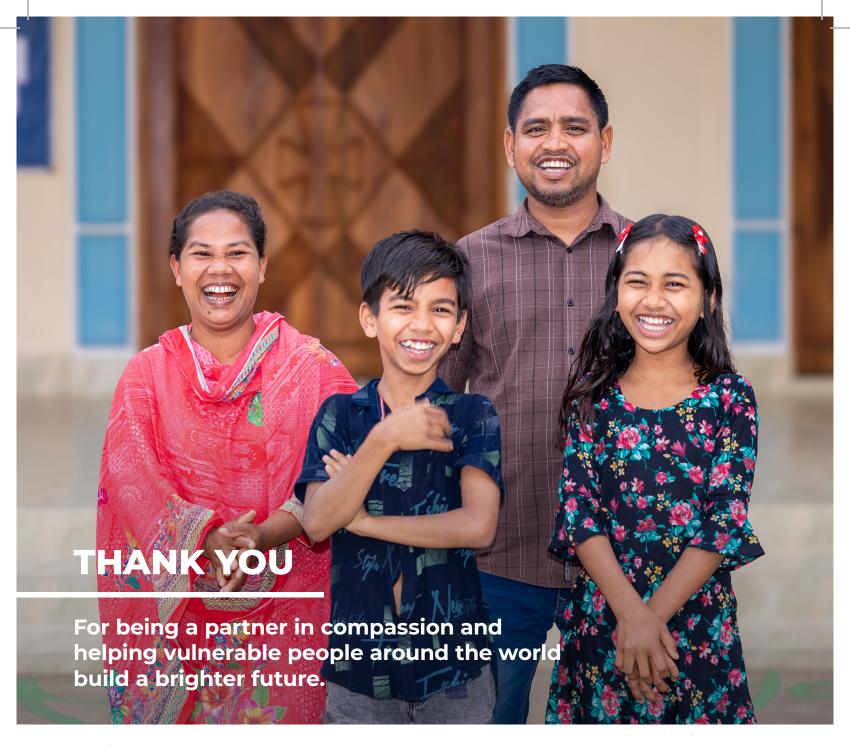
