

#### THESTATEMENT

On May 26th 2017, over 250 Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander leaders gathered together to establish a path towards incorporating First Nations voice in the Australian Constitution. This was written as a document titled *the 'Uluru Statement of the Heart'*.

Directed to the Australian people, this historic peace offering was made to empower Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples as they call for legislative change and constitutional recognition. Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people have never been recognised in the Australian constitution since its creation. Listen to the full statement here.



#### **THEARTWORK**

The artwork surrounding the statement was led by Maruku artist, Rene Kulitja, and was painted by Multijulu artists.


The artwork depicts Uluru-Ku Tjukurrpa (The Uluru Story) which has been passed down from many generations, and tells a story of connection from all corners of the land.
