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About Laudato Si' Week

Laudato Si' Week is a celebration held annually in May to mark the anniversary of Pope Francis' landmark encyclical on caring for creation. Sponsored by the Vatican's Dicastery for Promoting Integral Human Development, this global celebration unites Catholics to listen and respond together to the cry of creation, rejoice in the progress we have made in bringing *Laudato Si'* to life, and intensify our efforts through the Laudato Si' Action Platform as well as other opportunities for education and action.

In Laudato Si' Week 2024, let us gather in community to contemplate the wonder of creation and nurture seeds of hope for our "suffering planet" (LD 2).

Laudate Deum is a reminder about the urgency of the *Laudato Si'* message and the need for both personal and cultural transformation amidst our ecological and climate crises.

This year's Laudato Si' Week theme is inspired by the symbol for Season of Creation 2024, "firstfruits."

Let us be seeds of hope in our lives and our world, rooted in faith and love.

Chiquito's Story |

Seeds of Hope: Responding to 'the Cry of the Earth and the Cry of the Poor'





While Timor-Leste has made considerable progress in development, it still suffers from high levels of poverty. Climate change threatens to exacerbate vulnerability and inequality, particularly in food security. The rural poor and other marginalized groups are most vulnerable.

Chiquito is 35 years old and lives in Timor-Leste with his wife, two young children and his extended family. When his father died, he had the additional responsibility of looking after his mother, two sisters and their children and making sure there is enough food to feed the whole family.

"Our lives were simple, however we faced challenges when we did not have enough funds to respond to urgent needs, such as urgent medical bills or whenever there were traditional ceremonies," Chiquito said.

Timor-Leste is one of Australia's closest geographical neighbours, located just an hour's flight from Darwin, but the standard of living between the two countries could not be more different.

With high levels of poverty and a reliance on subsistence farming, many families like Chiquito's are extremely vulnerable to the effects of climate change.

"We consume what we grew from our vegetable gardens. We had very limited cash, so buying food was not an option for us," explained Chiquito.

Climate change is set to alter rainfall patterns, with Timor-Leste's food production likely to be one of the most affected by changes in rainfall in Southeast Asia. In combination with increased growing season temperatures, agricultural production may see reduced yields. - <u>Asia Development Bank</u>

Chiquito's Story Seeds of Hope: Responding to 'the Cry of the Earth and the Cry of the Poor'



Chiquito explains, "This year the impact of climate change is felt more compared to previous years. The previous year had its challenges, however we were able to get good results."

"The changing rain patterns make it difficult to decide when to plant our crops, if we make the wrong decision to plant and the rains do not come, we lose the whole crop for the year. This creates lean months for the whole community," Chiquito said.

Chiquito heard about a program run by one of Caritas Australia's partner in Timor-Leste, Caritas Diocesana Maliana. The 'Sustainable Livelihoods/Disaster Risk Reduction' program aims to build the resilience of vulnerable communities like Chiquito's through strengthening agriculture techniques and improving families' food security.

"The challenge for farmers in Timor-Leste, like Chiquito, is the lack of opportunity and support to learn new techniques and to increase their production and to be able to access markets. So programs such as this that gives that opportunity helps farmers to increase their potential and improve their livelihoods," said Fernando Pires, Caritas Australia's Timor-Leste Country Representative.

Through the program, Chiquito learnt skills in sustainable agriculture that enabled him to maximise the use of his land to grow a wide variety of crops. He also learnt business skills to better understand market demand and supply vegetables to supermarkets in the capital Dili to generate high income.

Chiguito's production has increased substantially, which means his family has enough income to meet their needs. They no longer have to worry about not having enough cash to buy food for his children or pay for basic medical expenses.

Chiguito's determination has made him a role model for other people in his community. He is using the funds from his successful harvest to invest back into the farm and also provide employment to two other people to work with him. He also volunteers to help at the farm of the orphanage just across the road, sharing his skills and knowledge with the nuns.

The new skills Chiguito has learnt through the program has increased his resilience to a changing climate, providing seeds of hope for the future.





In the spirit of a culture of encounter, we invite communities from around the world to take action with our Tree of Life campaign. Simply write a message to your Member of Parliament (MP) on how we can care for our common home together with them, in the language and spirit of cooperation.

Safer World for All campaign

Ask 3: Contribute to a safer climate future


- Make an annual commitment of \$4 billion for climate finance to support communities in the Pacific and Asia to act on climate change
- Provide a \$100 million initial contribution to the Loss and Damage Fund to provide crucial support to vulnerable nations facing the brunt of climate-related challenges (forced migration, biodiversity loss, food insecurity, etc.)
- Advance a global, just, and equitable phase out of coal, oil and gas through endorsing the call for a Fossil Fuel Non-Proliferation Treaty

Step 3. Write a message to your Member of Parliament (MP) on how we can care for our common home together.

- Use the leaf template provided in the <u>Together We Campaign Pack</u>
- Rather than criticising leaders and decision-makers, we are looking to engage with them within the spirit of cooperation.
- Rather than thinking about 'I', think about 'We'. Think about the community you belong to, and how your voice is representing a real community need. This way your message will have more authenticity.
- Think less confrontationally, and more collaboratively. Explain the problem you are asking them to address, and how together we can work to bring about positive change.






Step 4. Create your Tree of Life display and share it on social media

- Construct a tree (trunk and branches). You can use large branches that have fallen to the ground or create a paper tree with the Tree of Life template provided in the <u>Together We</u> <u>Campaign Pack</u>.
- Stick the leaves (letters) to the tree and leave them there for others to read.

Planting seeds of hope

Step 1. Determine where you can plant seeds (or seedlings)

Some ideas:

- · Rejuvenate an old garden bed or build a new one.
- Start a community herb garden.
- Create an indigenous garden and prayer space.
- Restore an unused green space.
- Restore sand dunes or riverbeds.
- · Provide seeds for students to take home to their own gardens.
- Consider if you are planting for food or pollination.

Step 2. Harvest seeds from other plants or purchase new seeds (or seedlings)

Some ideas:

- · Consider where you could collect seeds instead of buying seeds.
- Consider the time of year and your climate in addition to where you are planting when choosing your seeds.
- · Are there native/indigenous (local to your areas) plant species you could plant?
- Are there any local programs that can assist you to purchase seeds or could you ask your school community for donations?
- If planting for pollination, use the B&B Highway guides for your climate: <u>hot/arid</u>, <u>warm/humid</u>, <u>cool</u> or <u>temperate</u>.



Step 3. Plant seeds of hope!

Tips:

- Ensure the soil is good quality or boost the soil quality first.
- Ensure you have all the equipment and seeds ready to go.
- Enjoy!

Step 4. Care for your seeds.

Tips:

- Learn how to care for the seeds and plants once established.
- Have a roster to help water the plants.
- Share with others, the beauty (or produce) your plants provide.
