WELCOME

Last year was filled with emergencies and crises that many of us could have never imagined happening in our lifetime. For many vulnerable communities across the world, 2022 proved to be even more challenging and devastating than 2020 and 2021. Yet, despite everything we have endured in recent times, I have faith that together, as one human family, we can continue to work to make the world a more just and better place for all.

Each year, Project Compassion comes as a timely reminder of the importance of solidarity and how a single act of kindness – whether big or small, can make a life-changing impact in the lives of those who need it most.

My involvement with Caritas Australia dates back to when I was in primary school, carrying around my Project Compassion box. I knew then that, through the power of kindness and generosity, I could have a long-lasting difference in the lives of future generations.

The theme of Project Compassion is 'For All Future Generations'. This phrase is a powerful affirmation that the good that we do today will extend and impact the lives of generations to come. It is also a call for all of us to play our part in making the world a better place by working together as sisters and brothers in finding long-term solutions to global issues.

This year, the theme asks us to think about the great 'yes' that Mary spoke when the angel told her she was to become the mother of Jesus. She freely accepted God's invitation to take up a unique place in the history of the human family. The prayer Mary shared with her cousin Elizabeth says, "all generations will call me blessed". Her yes is for all future generations.

Project Compassion 2023 brings us the stories of four incredibly inspiring individuals whose futures have been touched by the relentless work of our partners and by your unwavering generosity. There is the story of 16-year-old



Laxmi, who lives in one of the most remote communities in Nepal. After losing her father at a young age, she was vulnerable to falling further into extreme poverty. But thanks to your generosity, and the support of our partner Caritas Nepal, Laxmi joined a child club, became a leader in her school and is now a mentor to other girls in her village.

This year, we are also bringing you the story Thu from Vietnam who, with the support of the Centre for Sustainable Rural Development, can now earn extra income and care for his wife despite his disability. There is also the story of Priscilla from Zimbabwe. Thanks to your support, she has had the opportunity to learn conservation farming skills to grow drought-resistant crops and farm poultry to support her family during the current food crisis. And finally, there is the story of Tereesa – a Gamilaroi woman from Western Sydney who struggled with homelessness while raising her four children. Through the Baabayn Young Mums and Bubs program, she was able to reconnect with her culture and create a better future for her children.

On behalf of everyone at Caritas Australia, I want to thank your school for your ongoing compassion and support towards the work that we do. These inspiring stories are living proof that your generosity can make a life-changing impact and create better opportunities so that future generations may live to their full potential and thrive.

CHECKLIST

- □ REGISTER your class for live Caritas
 Q&A sessions: caritas.org.au/projectcompassion/caritas-q-and-a/ These are live Q&A
 sessions with Caritas staff and partners. Sessions
 available for Y4–6 and Y7–12.
- □ DISTRIBUTE individual or class boxes. If possible, offer these to students and teachers individually, either as people leave the Ash Wednesday Mass or after Communion, signifying the link between saying 'Amen' to the Body of Christ and 'being' the Body of Christ in the world today.
- □ PLAN engaging fundraising activities. See the Fundraising Booklet for ideas.
- WATCH films: Watch the Project Compassion School Film and Day in the Life films before showing students to ensure they are suitable for your audience. Note: The films are subtitled for students with hearing impairments.
- □ **DISPLAY posters** prominently in your school reception, other meeting rooms and classrooms.
- MEET WITH your student/teacher organisers to plan a 'whole school' approach to raising awareness and fundraising during Project Compassion this year.

DURING THE SIX WEEKS OF LENT

We offer four stories to share with your school community. The stories highlight how Caritas Australia is working together with vulnerable communities around the world, empowering them to develop their strengths and create lasting change.

CHECKLIST

- □ SHARE stories. Insert the Project Compassion School Newsletter Notice in your weekly school newsletters.
- □ USE Weekly Staff Reflections for staff meetings/prayer. Resource available at caritas.org.au/project-compassion
- □ SHOW the PC23 films. A popular time is during assemblies, Religious Education classes or homeroom.
- □ SHARE your school or class fundraising activities on social media.

HOLY WEEK / LAST WEEK OF TERM 1

- □ USE the 'Way of the Cross' presentation (which comes with leader's notes) as a prayer and reflection activity for the whole school.
- ☐ THANK the school community by placing a Thank You notice in your school newsletter/social media, sharing how much money was raised.
- □ FORWARD your donations and Record of Receipts sheet to Caritas Australia before 31 May 2023.

WHAT ARE CARITAS O&As?

During Project Compassion, Caritas Australia is offering the chance to interact online with our staff and partners in Australia and overseas!

Caritas Q&As are 30-minute sessions hosted by Caritas Australia on Zoom. The sessions are a unique opportunity for students to connect with the people positively affected through Caritas-supported programs and to learn more about the impact of their generous donations.

Caritas Q&As are open to students in Years 4–12 and are available across all time zones.

HOW WILL IT WORK?

Caritas Q&As run across Lent during school term and will focus on a different Project Compassion story and program each week.

Help prepare your students for a Caritas Q&A by:

- Showing them the relevant Project Compassion video
- Working through our Project Compassion school resources or relevant social justice resources
- Guiding them to create a question to ask Caritas staff/partners.








CATHOLIC SOCIAL TEACHING (CST) GUIDE



Catholic Social Teaching (CST) principles cover all spheres of life – the economic, political, ecological, personal and spiritual. The principles are inspired by scripture and the writings of the Pope and other Catholic leaders about social issues.

Caritas Australia's work is shaped by the tradition of Catholic Social Teaching.

HUMAN DIGNITY

We believe every human being is created in the image and likeness of God and therefore has inherent dignity that should always be safeguarded.



SUBSIDIARITY AND PARTICIPATION

We believe all people have the right to participate in decisions that affect their lives. Subsidiarity requires that decisions are made by people closest and most affected by the issues and concerns of the community.





SOLIDARITY

We believe we are part of one human family and have a responsibility to help each person achieve their full potential.



THE COMMON GOOD

We believe the good of each human person is intimately related to the good of the whole community. We are all responsible for each other.

PREFERENTIAL OPTION FOR THE POOR

We believe in prioritising the women, men and children most vulnerable to extreme poverty and injustice.



CARE FOR OUR COMMON HOME

We believe that care for our common home is vital for the common good of all people. We believe a true ecological approach is a social approach. We are to be protectors of creation and of one another

FUNDRAISING FOR SOCIAL JUSTICE



Caritas Australia believes that fundraising should be FUN! It's also an opportunity to raise awareness about important issues, and a chance for the community to take part in a social justice action. Everyone who contributes is empowered and able to stand in solidarity, with the communities we serve and those who benefit from our actions.

STEP 1: ACT CHARITABLY

Give money: this helps meet immediate needs and is vital. But charity alone cannot end the cycle of poverty. Taking the next steps can do more to have a positive impact in the most vulnerable communities.

<u>Suggested action:</u> Collect funds using your Project Compassion donation box. Funds collected go to long-term integral human development programs and emergency relief programs.

STEP 2: RAISE AWARENESS

Help others understand the issues that people experiencing extreme poverty are faced with. Inform your community about how donations can help communities gain access to clean water, food security, basic healthcare and safety.

<u>Suggested actions:</u> Show one of the Project Compassion films, display printed materials around your school and include notices in your school newsletter. Share information on social media. Learn more at caritas.org.au/project-compassion

STEP 3: ACT IN SOLIDARITY

Actions like walking a long way – in solidarity with those who walk a long way to collect water, or those fleeing conflict zones to safety, promote empathy and understanding. When you walk in the shoes of the world's most vulnerable, you start to understand, with compassion, the injustices these communities face.

<u>Suggested action:</u> 'Walk a kilometre in their shoes' by trying some of the solidarity actions such as the Water Challenge.

STEP 4: ACT FOR SOCIAL JUSTICE

Take social justice actions to address underlying issues and create lasting change. These actions could focus on participation, care for creation, peace, sustainability, inclusion and justice. As well as taking action, take some time to reflect on what you're doing.

<u>Suggested action:</u> Take action for social justice by supporting climate justice. Many of our partners are experiencing the harsh impacts of climate change.



STUDENT ACTION PLANNER



PLANNING GROUP MEMBERS:

1. THINK

What is the focus of your campaign? Why is this issue important?

2. LEARN

What facts and figures do you need? Where can you get this information? Make it real with an example of a Caritas Australia community development program.

3. TOOLS

For example, social media, posters, stalls, newsletter items, slides from the Caritas Australia website, music, an event or assembly presentation, etc..

4. CONTACTS AND PERMISSIONS

Make an appointment to see your Principal to talk about what you have learnt and how you would like to engage the rest of the school community.

Who else do you need to speak to? (E.g. teachers, parish priest, participants, others)

Have a chat with your school media person as they might have some good contacts with local newspapers. Get your justice agenda out into your wider community! Share the good news!

5. SET A DATE

When will your main event take place?

When will you start preparations?

When do you need to start promotion?
