## Information for Teachers Photo Matching Activity


## Information for Teachers Photo Matching Activity

#### Instructions:

- Create five packs by printing pages 6-11. In each pack place the strips with the CST principle (headings page 6) already cut up, along with a copy of each of the photos including the captions (pages 7-11).
- Divide your class into five groups.
- Distribute one pack of headings and photographs to each group.
- Display the appropriate poster (see next pages to view in full screen) while students sit in groups and match the
  photographs with the most appropriate principle.

- Encourage students to share their thinking and explain their answers to the class.
- Students may have different answers and justifications for their choices.
- · There may be more than one photo per principle.
- The principles are not independent of each other.






